Year 9:
Philosophy

Curriculum Intent: Students will develop a firm understanding of the beliefs, teachings and practices of the two largest world religions: Christianity and Islam. An exploration of Christian teachings and sources before studying 'Religion, philosophy and ethics in the modern world from a Christian perspective' in Year 10 prepares students for engaging in more complex discussions in philosophical debates. Students will build up the core knowledge needed, supporting this with sources of wisdom and authority and real-life examples of Christians and Muslims in the world today. Students will be introduced to the layout of the Christianity and Islam exam papers this year including the assessment objectives and command words used for each question.
