

### Author Profile: H G Wells

H. G. Wells was born on the 21st of September, 1866 in Bromley, Kent. He grew up very poor and, when he was 14 was apprenticed to a draper, though this didn't last long. He apprenticed with many different trades, including a chemist, before winning a scholarship to study Science at the Royal College. He graduated from London University in 1888 and became a science teacher. He started writing text books at first, and then began a career of writing science fiction novels such as The Island of Docot Moreau, The Invisible Man, The War of the Worlds, and The Time Machine. He was also involved with the League of Nations, the precursor to the United Nations, as a proponent for progressive causes. He died in 1946 in London.

The 26th of September is **European Day of Langauges (EU)** so why not learn more about European languages and maybe even do our quiz?


The 27th of September is **World Tourism Day (UN)**, so why not learn more about tourism and its impact on the world on this day?
